Reporting at Highfield School

Highfield School reports digitally through Hero, our Student Management System. Hero has a number of advantages over traditional, paper reports including:

- A live system, enabling updates for parents
- Reporting can include a range of media e.g. photo, video, links to Google Docs
- Parents and students can contribute
- Reports can be downloaded and printed if required
- Easily accessible - phone app or computer

How will it look

During the year teachers will add:

- Curriculum posts to either whole class or on individual child's learning page
- Progress and achievement graphs against the Highfield School Expectations in Reading, Writing and Maths (Updated in Term 2 & Term 4)
- Report slideshow showing how your child is developing and progressing (uploaded in Term 2 & Term 4)
- Hauora School Values Rubric (Term 2 Blue / Term 4 Red)
- Inquiry Skills Rubric across the curriculum (Term 2 Blue / Term 4 Red)

Parents will receive **ONE** form of notification when a community post or student learning post is published. If they log into the Hero mobile app they will receive an in-app notification. If they log into Hero via a web browser they will receive an email notification.

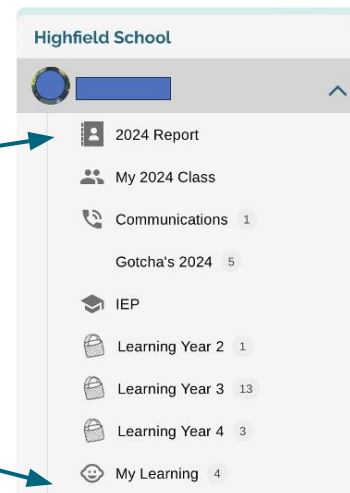


This digital report provides you with personalised information about your child's progress and achievement in **Reading**, **Writing** and **Maths**.

Progression

Literacy and Numeracy are important foundation skills for children. Primary and Intermediate schools focus on these because your child needs to have sound Reading, Writing and Maths skills to be able to do well in every area of learning at school and in life.

Teachers use many different ways to find out where your child is at. This includes a range of formal tests and assessments, watching your child working in the classroom, talking with your child about their learning and having your child assess their own and other's work.

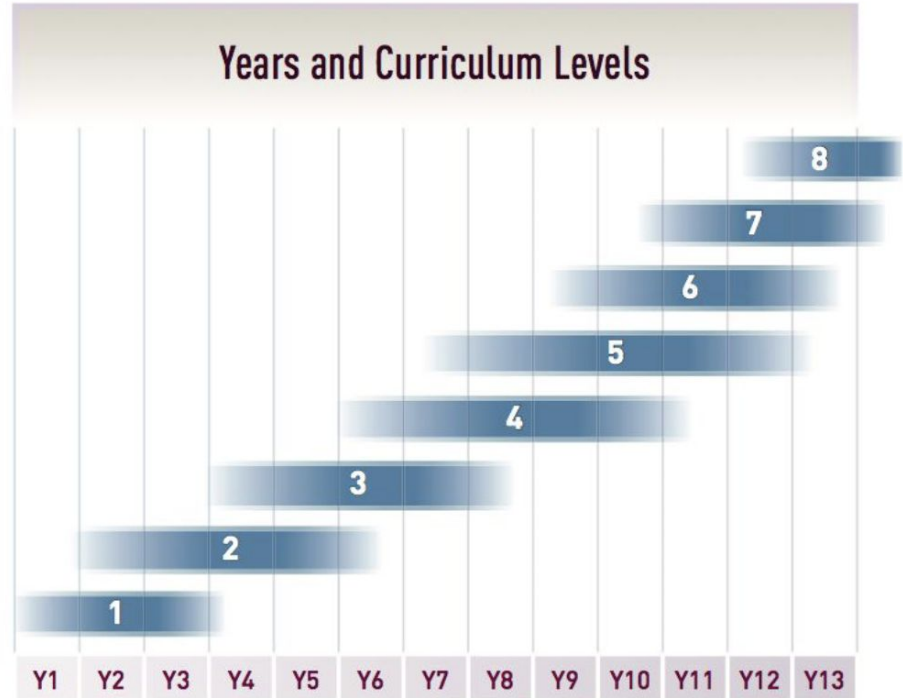

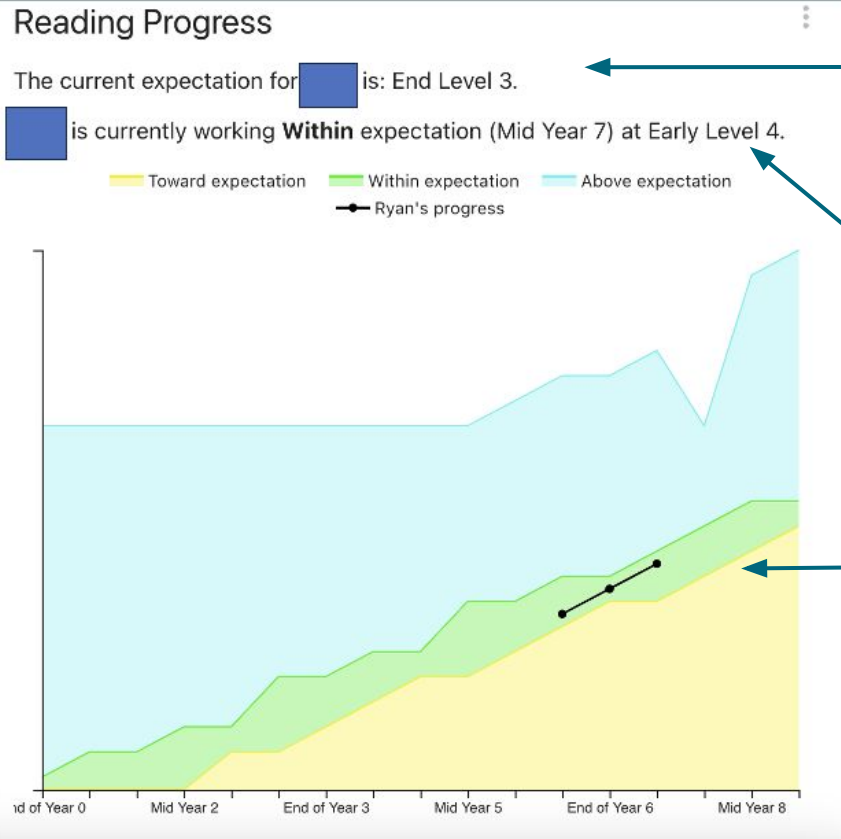
The New Zealand Curriculum Levels

This diagram shows how curriculum levels typically relate to years at school. Many students do not, however, fit this pattern. They include those with special learning needs, those who are gifted and those who come from non-English-speaking backgrounds. Students learning an additional language are also unlikely to follow the suggested progression: level 1 is the entry level for those with no prior knowledge of the language being learned, regardless of their school year.
